Current Telecommunication Environment

- ONP Provisions
- Weakened ownership rights
- Regulations of many prices
- Anticompetition law meddling
- Arbitrary division of markets

Offical reasoning behind regulations...

- Historical references
- Alleged abuse of dominant position
- Alleged inefficient duplication
- Unification and standardization

...and what is wrong with them – historical references

- No telecommunication company became a monopoly "naturaly" – there was always some government intervention
- All evidence shows that free markets favor more companies, proprietory networks and technologies and that past investments are generally of no advantage for incumbents

...and what is wrong with them – abuse of dominant position I

- Any such arguments heavily depend on market definition
- Make a very narrow market and you will find any company or even a man in dominant or even monopolistic position
- How to define the "abuse"? low prices, bundling, high prices? All of those can be perfectly rational strategies on competitive markets – who is the judge?

...and what is wrong with them – abuse of dominant position II

Some data – the case of the Czech Republic, 2005

- Voice market: CTc 35%, Eurotel 28%, TMO – 24%, Vodafone – 13%
- Broadband CTc 40%, CATVs 27%, Eurotels CDMA – 13%, WiFi etc. – 20%
- "Slow" Internet Access data are not available (dial-up, GPRS etc.)

...and what is wrong with them – inefficient duplication

- Who knows in advance what is inefficient?
- Typical duplications in network industries mobile networks, gas stations, cable and telecommunication wires
- Inefficient investment will decease anyway, so why to block them?
- Historical evidence support duplication and they generally are in favor of consumers desire

...and what is wrong with them – unification and standardization

- Who can tell in advance what is beter technology or standard?
- Typical examples of in-advance mistakes: Beta, GSM, UMTS

Consequences of current policies

- Lower amount of investments
- Wrong structure of investments
- Slowed technological progress and innovations
- Inefficient use of precious capital
- Higher interest rates
- Crowding-out effect
- Greater ,,Digital Divine" than necessary

The Way Out of Current Trap

- Abolishing of the ONP provisions
- Market for EMS
- Lifting antitrust regulations away
- Banning of all price regulations
- Cancelling of the universal service obligations
- Protection of property laws
